Subj: DESIGNATION OF AREAS AND PROPERTY AS VITAL TO NATIONAL SECURITY, OF SUBSTANTIAL IMPORTANCE TO NATIONAL SECURITY, OR INHERENTLY DANGEROUS

TO OTHERS (DESIGNATED RESTRICTED AREAS)

- 1. Purpose. Publish areas and property within Marine Corps Installations East-Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune (MCIEAST-MCB CAMLEJ) which are vital to national security, of substantial importance to national security, or are inherently dangerous to others.
- 2. Cancellation. MCIEAST-MCB CAMLEJBul 5500 of 19 Sep 17.
- 3. Background. Installations are required to designate restricted areas in accordance with the references (a) through (d).

4. Action

a. Commander's Intent and Concept Operations

- (1) Commander's Intent. Identify and designate appropriate areas as vital or of substantial importance to national security or inherently dangerous to others so that law enforcement and security personnel know when/where use of deadly force maybe justified in defense of property.
- (2) Concept of Operations. Law enforcement personnel will be familiar with areas designated as vital and of substantial importance to national security and areas inherently dangerous to others. The Provost Marshal Office (PMO), Physical Security Section shall assist in preparing enclosure (1).

b. Tasks

(1) Department Heads shall:

(a) Annually designate areas within their cognizance which meet

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the requirements of references (b) and (c), by submitting respective areas of enclosure (1) to the Installation Security Officer.

- (b) Ensure areas designated meet the requirements per reference (b).
- (c) Ensure annual physical security surveys are conducted by the ${\mbox{PMO}}$ Physical Security Section.

(2) Installation Security Officer shall:

- (a) Be familiar with this Bulletin and all applicable references.
- (b) Annually consolidate all designated areas from Department Heads, and prepare a letter for the designation of restricted areas for the Commanding Officer's (COs) signature.

(3) COs shall:

- (a) Ensure personnel assigned to law enforcement and/or security duties are thoroughly indoctrinated on the contents of references (b) and (d).
- (b) Designate areas within their cognizance which meet the requirements of references (b) and (c), are guarded by local security personnel, are temporary in nature, or not otherwise designated in this Bulletin.
- (c) Annually provide PMO, Physical Security Section a list of areas under their cognizance designated as restricted.
- (d) Ensure areas designated meet the requirements per reference (c).
- (e) Ensure annual physical security surveys are conducted by PMO, Physical Security Section.
- (4) <u>PMO shall</u>: Consolidate listings of all areas designated as restricted aboard MCB CAMLEJ, as provided by the Department Heads and COs aboard the Installation.
- c. <u>Coordinating Instructions</u>. Reference (d) provides Marine Corps policy concerning arming law enforcement and security personnel and the use of deadly force. The application of deadly force by law enforcement and security personnel is considered justified in defense of property involving national security which is specifically designated by the CO as being vital or of substantial importance to national security. Additionally, the application of deadly force is considered justified in defense of property not involving national security, but which is inherently dangerous to others.
- (1) <u>In Defense of Property Involving National Security</u>. Use of deadly force reasonably appears to be necessary for the following:

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- (a) To prevent the threatened theft of, damage to, or espionage aimed at property or information specifically designated in writing by a CO or other competent authority as vital to national security.
- (b) To prevent the actual theft of, damage to, or espionage aimed at property or information specifically designated in writing by a CO or other competent authority which, though not vital to national security, is of substantial importance to national security.
- (2) Property Not Involving National Security but Inherently Dangerous to Others. When deadly force reasonably appears to be necessary to prevent the actual theft or sabotage of property, such as operable weapons or ammunition, which in the hands of an unauthorized individual presents a substantial potential danger of death or serious bodily harm to others.
- 5. Administration and Logistics. Property will be specifically designated as vital to national security only when its loss, damage, or compromise would seriously prejudice national security or jeopardize the fulfillment of an essential national defense mission. In order for law enforcement and security personnel to apply paragraphs 4c(1) and (2) above, they must know which areas or property qualify as "Restricted Areas" per reference (c).
- a. <u>Level One</u>. The least secure type of restricted area, it contains a security interest that if lost, stolen, compromised, or sabotaged would cause damage to the command mission and national security.
- b. <u>Level Two</u>. The second most secure type of restricted area, it contains a security interest that if lost, stolen, compromised, or sabotaged would cause serious damage to the command mission and national security.
- c. <u>Level Three</u>. The most secure type of restricted area, it contains a security interest that if lost, stolen, compromised, or sabotaged would cause grave damage to the command mission and national security.

6. Reserve Applicability. This Bulletin is applicable to all MCIEAST-MCB CAMLEJ, subordinate commands, tenant commands, and rectorates.
